Richard Van Boxtel

Richard Van Boxtel is an enrolled member of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and the recently retired Chief of Police for the Oneida Police Department in Oneida, Wisconsin. Rich began his law enforcement career at the Oneida Police Department in 1992 as a patrol officer. In 1995, he was promoted to Sergeant and has held other interim positions in the department as Lieutenant and Assistant Chief, eventually promoted to Chief of Police in 2006. Rich has an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice - Law Enforcement from Northeast Wisconsin Technical College. Rich holds a Bachelor's Degree in Public Services Administration from Silver Lake College, a Master's Degree in Management and Organizational Behavior from Silver Lake College and is a graduate of the 250th class of the FBI National Academy. Rich is the former Chairman for the Native American Drug and Gang Initiative in Wisconsin and has served on the Wisconsin Criminal Justice Coordinating Council and the Governor's Council on Highway Safety. Additionally, Rich is a Navy Veteran who served during Operation Desert Storm.

Francis E. Bradley Sr.

Francis Bradley Sr. has been an Indian Country Peace Keeper for over 38 years, serving in law enforcement and public safety. During that time, Officer Bradley's has successfully integrated modern, traditional and cultural beliefs while working in tribal, state and federal jurisdictions. He is the former Chief of Police for the Hualapai Nation Police Department and a former Commander with the Navajo Nation Police Department. Chief Bradley is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and is the former Indian Country Representative on the FBI Criminal Justice Information system (CJIS) Uniform Crime Reporting Sub Committee. Additionally, he is certified through IMBPA for bicycle patrol operations.

Warren Warrington

Master Sergeant Warren Warrington began his law enforcement career in June 1985 with the Menominee Tribal Police Department and has been with the department for over 30 years. He has served in various capacities at the Police Department, including Correctional Officer, Patrolman, Patrol Sergeant, Investigator, and Master Sergeant. Warren has supervised the Menominee Tribal Police Patrol Division and the Menominee Sex Offender Registration and Notification program. He has also been assigned as the Police Department Liaison to the Menominee Healing to Wellness Court. Warren assisted the National Association of Drug Court Professionals in the development of training curriculum. Additionally, Master Sergeant Warrington is a United States Army Veteran, a graduate of the Menominee Indian School District, and attended the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.
