The Justice Grants System (JustGrants) and the Automated Standard Application for Payments (ASAP) are Now Live

The Department of Justice (DOJ) grant making components—the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office), the Office of Justice Programs (OJP), and the Office on Violence Against Women

(OVW)—have established a website to serve as a resource hub for their grants management system (JustGrants) and payment management system (ASAP), both of which launched on October 15, 2020. <u>Virtual Consultation on the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 Crime Victims Fund Tribal Set-Aside Formula Program</u>

The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) invites Tribal leaders, representatives, and stakeholders to participate in a Virtual Consultation on the Tribal Set-Aside from the Crime Victims Fund for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021. Attendees can choose to attend either one or both virtual consultations. During the consultations, attendees will discuss the FY 2021 Crime Victims Fund Tribal Set-Aside and potential revisions to the interim formula and application process used in 2020. The Tribal Victim Services Set-Aside



Program provides support to Tribal communities to improve services for victims of crime.

The virtual consultation's registration site supplies a **Framing Paper** that provides background and questions to consider in advance of the consultations. OVC TTAC is presenting an online Expert Q&A discussion called Supporting Indigenous Victims of Violence, hosted by Peggy Bird and Sarah Deer. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), homicide is the third leading cause of death among American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) women between the ages of 0 and 24, and the fifth leading cause of death for AI/AN women between 25 and 34 years of age. FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

FY20 Community Connect Grant Program Department of Agriculture-Utilities Programs

The Community Connect Grant Program provides financial assistance to eligible applicants that will provide service at or above the Broadband Grant Speed to all premises in rural, economically-challenged communities where broadband service does not exist. The deployment of broadband services on a "community-oriented connectivity" basis stimulates economic development and provides enhanced educational and health care opportunities in rural areas. Rural Utilities Services will give priority to rural areas that demonstrate the greatest need for broadband services, based on the criteria contained in the application.

FY20 Farm to School Grants Department of Agriculture-Food and Nutrition Service

The Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act (NSLA) establishes a Farm to School Program in order to assist eligible entities, through grants and technical assistance, in implementing Farm to School Programs that improve access to local foods in eligible schools.

To fulfill the Farm to School mandate in the NSLA, \$5 million is provided to the Department of Agriculture (USDA) on an annual basis to support grants, technical assistance, and the federal administrative costs related to USDA's Farm to School Program. The USDA Farm to School Grant Program is housed within the Food and



Nutrition Services' (FNS) Office of Community Food Systems (OCFS). Additional funding for the Farm to School Grant Program was made available through agricultural appropriations and, as a result, up to \$10 million will be awarded under this solicitation.

FY20 Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Department of Homeland Security-FEMA

The BRIC program makes federal funds available to states, U.S. territories, American Indian/Alaska Native Tribal governments, and local communities for pre-disaster mitigation activities. The guiding principles of the program are to: (1) support state and local governments, Tribes, and territories through capability- and capacity-building enabling them to identify mitigation actions and implement projects that reduce risks posed by natural hazards; (2) encourage and enable innovation while allowing flexibility, consistency, and effectiveness; (3) promote partnerships and enable high-impact investments to reduce risk from natural hazards with a focus on critical services and facilities, public infrastructure, public safety, public health, and communities; (4) provide a significant opportunity to reduce future losses and minimize impacts on the Disaster Relief Fund (DRF); and (5) support the adoption and enforcement of building codes, standards, and policies that will protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, take into account future conditions, and have long-lasting impacts on community risk-reduction such as critical services and facilities and for future disaster costs.

FY21 Funding Guidance for State and Tribal Response Programs-United States Environmental Protection Agency



Section 128(a) of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA), as amended, authorizes a noncompetitive \$50 million grant program to establish or enhance state and Tribal response programs. Generally, these response programs address the assessment, cleanup, and redevelopment of brownfields and other sites with actual or perceived contamination.
