Addressing Today's Public Safety Concerns

NCJTC provides the framework, roadmap, training, and resources to serve individuals, organizations, and communities to address the most pressing public safety needs.

Most recently, the spotlight has turned to school safety. Just over 22 years ago, the Columbine High School shooting shook the nation and as a result, NCJTC received federal funding from the Department of Justice to carry out comprehensive school safety training programs across the nation. Our training and technical assistance programs set the standard for training school and law enforcement executives, as well as community leaders and public policy makers. We successfully trained interdisciplinary teams across the country to share information, resources, and expertise to address school safety concerns and established formalized systems cooperation and collaboration.

NCJTC provides school safety training through regional conferences and cost recovery training programs on topics crucial to meeting the current threat and needs of the criminal justice and school communities across America.



Collaborative Approaches to School Safety

School safety teams are the focus of the School Resource Officer Conference, held annually in Wisconsin. Since 2009, the conference has grown from 75 law enforcement attendees representing agencies to nearly 300 school and other law enforcement personnel, representing 26 states, 29 tribal communities, and Canada. The conference sessions address ongoing and emerging school safety and security concerns and trends.

Conference topics covered each year include:

- Active shooter and other threats
- Internet safety and social media concerns
- Juvenile sex trafficking
- Alcohol and substance abuse trends
- Bullying and cyberbullying
- Effective interventions for at-risk youth
- Working with students living with mental illness
- Crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques

Conference sessions also highlight successful program models, promising practices, and case studies that attendees can take back to their schools with them. The tools and lessons learned can be adapted to fit the needs of their departments and/or school communities. Because collaboration is the key to success, we encourage entire school safety teams to attend to obtain the greatest benefit from the conference.

Relevant Training for Safer Schools

In addition to the annual School Resource Officer Conference, NCJTC has responded swiftly to develop several new training offerings in the wake of recent events. Through collaboration with communities and organizations, we developed training sessions that cover threat assessment, prevention, critical issues, and responses to school safety concerns. Preparation is imperative to mitigating any further threats to the safety of our children.

Current topics include:

- Understanding psychological and behavioral aspects of threat assessment and management
- Building an effective threat assessment system
- Identifying red flags before an incident takes place
- Preparation and response to active shooter scenarios
- Stabilizing and organizing critical incident events
- Developing emergency action plans

Our subject matter experts and staff are committed to developing relevant training opportunities to address the unique needs of our school communities.
