


Sex Offender Treatment Providers




"How often does collaboration between victim advocates and sex offender management professionals occur in your community?"

Sex offender treatment providers' perceptions






What level of collaboration is there between offender management and victim services?

Public Education Best Practice: Community Notification

- Sharing sex offender registration information with the community
- An opportunity to educate the public about a specific offender, the registration system, and sex offenders in general
- Notifications include:
 - ✓ Electronic alerts
 - ✓ Business notifications
 - ✓ Child-serving agency notifications
 - ✓ Written materials
 - √ Community meetings





Supervision



Supervision Best Practice Strategies

- ✓ Specialized training/qualifications for officers
- ✓ Small caseloads
- ✓ Long-term supervision for moderate- to high-risk offenders
- Supervision guidelines and special conditions
- ✓ Validated risk assessment tools
- ✓ Multidisciplinary collaboration
- ✓ Be aware of victim notification issues

Treatment Best Practices

Sex offense specific treatment

- Cognitive behavioral therapy
- Motivational interviewing
- Trauma informed care

Restorative justice approaches

- Circles of support and accountability (COSA)
- Survivor/offender dialogues
- Clarification sessions

Reentry Best Practices


- Early collaborative planning
- Close coordination with victim services
- ✓ Identify community support systems
- ✓ Treatment in:
 - jail and prison
 - transitional living to improve safety, success



Important Takeaways and Where To Begin

- ✓ Develop a multidisciplinary team
- ✓ Support victim centered offender management
- ✓ Identify specialized programming and training
- ✓ Implement risk monitoring strategies


Summary
