

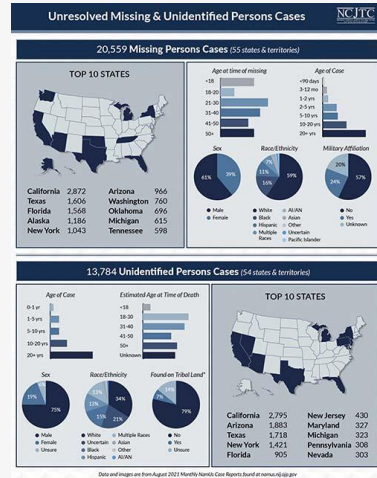
This month's edition focuses on missing and unidentified persons cases.

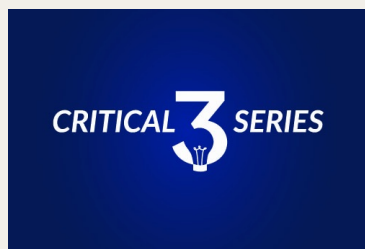
