## September is National Recovery Month - Let's Break the Stigma


According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), in 2023 over "30.5 million adults aged 18 or older perceived that they ever had a substance use problem" with 7 of 10 adults considering themselves in recovery (SAMHSA, 2023). This is an encouraging statistic that may signify a growing awareness, increased access to resources and a willingness to recovery. ## Our Tribal Response to Alcohol & Substance Misuse Training & Technical Assistance Program Champions Recovery

NCJTC is honored to serve as the training and technical assistance provider for the Tribal Responses to Alcohol and Substance Misuse TTA Program, funded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice. The TRASM TTA Program provides support to BJA Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation Purpose Area 3 grantees, tribal Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant and Substance Use Program (COSSUP) grantees, and other interested tribal communities.

The over-arching goals of our TRASM TTA program are to build the capacity of tribal justice-funded grantees and tribal justice systems in preventing and reducing crime related to the impact of illicit opioids, stimulants, and other substances on tribal members and communities, reduce the number of overdose fatalities, and foster healing and culturally based pathways to recovery.

Training and technical assistance (TTA) opportunities include: onsite meeting facilitation and customized & specialized training, regional trainings, conferences, webinars and virtual training, peer-to-peer support, written resources on alcohol and substance misuse, community planning, justice system collaboration and grantee best practices.

This program also seeks to enhance multidisciplinary and multi-jurisdictional collaborations including with federal, state, and local partners to address public safety and wellness needs. Providing a holistic approach to supporting our Tribal partners remains one of our top priorities, as we deploy a multi-phase approach to partners.

The first phase remains centered on creating awareness of the trends, risks, and approaches to blending evidence-based practices with culturally driven treatment and interventions.

The second phase is focused on providing training, resources and support as they implement changes within their communities.



TRASM TTA program also maintains a very close, collaborative relationship with external agencies and other BJA Tribal TTA Providers and COSSUP TTA Providers to ensure comprehensive and cohesive support is provided to tribal communities.

Native Americans experience substance use disorders at a higher rate than White Americans due to several factors including: historical trauma, socioeconomic challenges, and limited access to culturally relevant healthcare. These factors contribute to increased vulnerability and highlight the need for targeted support and treatment.

According to SAMHSA, American Indian/Alaska Natives (AI/AN) are three times as likely to be diagnosed with substance use disorders and 4 in 10 Native American adolescents (12-17 years) having a lifetime prevalence of illicit drug use.
