## Safer Internet Day - Starting a Conversation About Online Safety

The internet can be both a blessing and a curse - providing valuable opportunities for learning and connection, but also posing significant risks, including child exploitation, human trafficking, sextortion, and cyberbullying. Protecting children online requires awareness, proactive safety measures, and ongoing education. At NCJTC, we offer specialized training to help safeguard children from online threats and equip professionals with the skills to use digital resources in investigations.

Specialized training aside, here are some general tips for protecting children online:

- **Monitor online activity** and be aware of apps/games/websites being used
- **Stay informed with emerging threats**, trends and new apps
- **Teach children** how to recognize manipulative tactics used by predators
- **Have open conversations** and encourage kids to recognize red flags and report anything suspicious
- **Set privacy controls** and use parental controls

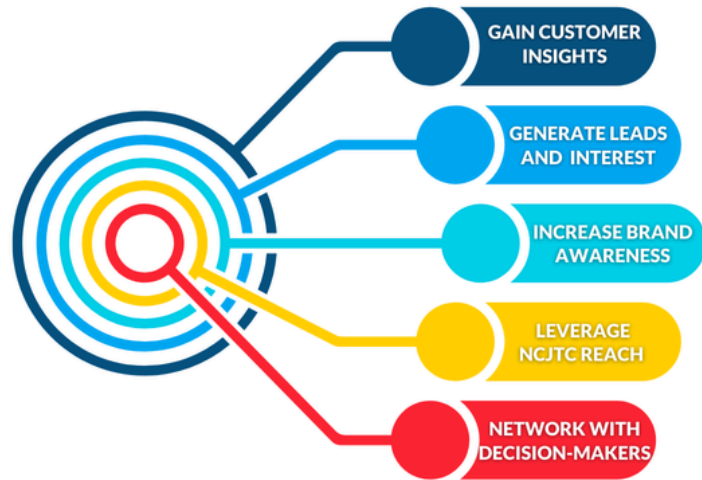

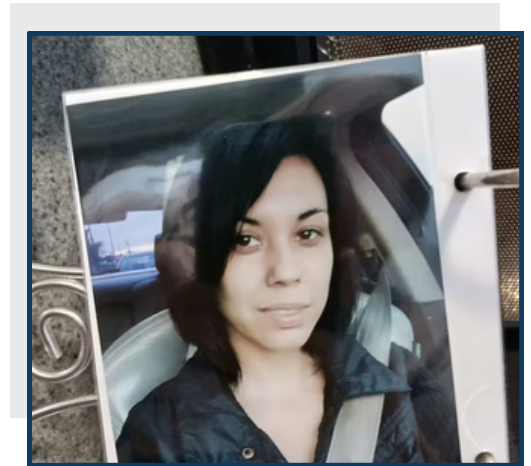
Here's what you'll find inside our first issue of 2025:

## Missing Indigenous Persons alert deemed success

More than two years ago, Washington became the **first state to implement alerts for missing Indigenous people**. Today, law enforcement officials say the alerts—enacted in response to statistics showing that Indigenous persons go missing at a higher rate than other groups—have **proved** crucial in locating missing teens, many of whom can become victims of trafficking.

## Big Turnout!



Rincon Band of Luiseño Indians Tribal government officials and dozens of other child protection/emergency management officials joined AMBER Alert in Indian Country (AIC) team members David Chewiwie and Matt Hall for a Child Abduction Tabletop Exercise (CATE) in Valley Center, California, January 17. The training exercise allowed the Tribe and its stakeholders to walk through a

fictional missing/abducted child incident to assess their response and needs. Joining Rincon Tribal government, police, and public safety officials were key members of several San Diego, Riverside, and San Bernardino Tribes, as well as a Karuk Tribe of Northern California representative. There were also officials from the San Diego County Sheriff's Department, San Diego County District Attorney's Office, Riverside County Sheriff's Department, California Highway Patrol (AMBER Alert Coordinator and CHP Tribal Liaison's Office), California Department of Justice/Office of Native American Affairs, Tribal Indian Health Council, and Native Victim advocates.
