Right Place, Right Time

Two participants, who attended the breakout session titled *Missing and Endangered Children in Indian Country: A Case Study of an Interstate Recovery and Return to Gila River Indian Community*, approached a NCJTC staff member with an urgent need to speak to the presenters from that session. They had just been informed that they had an active missing person case that required immediate assistance.

Recognizing that the session presenter's knowledge and expertise were exactly what they needed at that moment, NCJTC connected them to each other. One of the presenters was NCJTC Program Manager, Tyesha Woods, who leveraged Tribal and Federal resources to help with the case. Based upon this quick response, the missing person was on her way back home within hours. This is a true and powerful testament to the training, networking and relationship-building opportunities afforded through the MUPC that have a real-world impact!
