

What is a Public Information Officer?

An agency designated individual that is responsible for disseminating information from the organization to the public, media, and other stakeholders.

Their main role is to ensure accurate, timely, and consistent communication, especially during emergencies, public events and crises.



Key Responsibilities

- Media relations
- Press releases and statements
- Crisis communications
- Public outreach



Unique Challenges Tribal Law Enforcement Agencies Face in Missing Child Cases

- Jurisdictional complexity
- Limited resources
- Lack of established protocols
- Gaps in communication and notification
- Cultural considerations



Role of a PIO in Missing or Abducted Child Investigations

- Coordinating public alerts
- Media relations
- Managing information flow
- Engaging the community
- Combating misinformation
- Supporting family communication



Role of the Law Enforcement Agency

- Provide timely and accurate information
- Designate a single voice
- Support the release of critical information
- Participate in joint information sharing
- Maintain situational awareness
- Respect the investigation timeline
- Include the PIO in planning
- Foster community engagement



Challenges & Solutions

- Jurisdictional complexity
- Cultural sensitivity and sovereignty
- Limited PIO and staffing resources
- Misinformation and social media rumors
- Delays in public notification
- Lack of coordination of messaging

Let's Start with Your Experience

Think back to a time your agency had to respond to a critical incident or missing person case.

- What was your biggest communication challenge?
- What worked well?
- Who was responsible for sharing information with the public?

Case Snapshot: Why PIO Coordination Matters

In 2022, a 12-year-old child went missing from a rural tribal community.

- Local LE began a search but did not issue a public statement for 8 hours.
- Families posted online, creating conflicting and inaccurate details.
- The public demanded answers, and mistrust escalated.

Lesson: A trained PIO helps protect the investigation, calm the community, and support families.

Draft a First Message for the Public

Your agency receives a credible report of a missing 10-year-old child. You are the designated PIO.

Draft a 3-sentence message you would post on your agency's social media or provide to the press.


- Guidelines:
 - Include only verified facts
 - Ask for public assistance (if appropriate)
 - Reflect cultural respect and urgency
