During Native American Heritage Month, and every month, we honor the enduring strength, cultural resilience, and collective wisdom of Native communities.



Recent Highlights

Strengthening Justice in Rural Alaska

We partnered with the Bristol Bay Native Association to support a community and justice system needs assessment serving 31 Tribes across 46,573 square miles.

"These resources have played a crucial role in equipping Native American tribes with the knowledge, skills, and tools necessary to enhance public safety, strengthen justice systems, and support community well-being."



Conducted focus groups and stakeholder interviews



Held bi-weekly virtual meetings and onsite workshops

Assessed infrastructure, policies, and procedural gaps

Outcomes:

- Set goals and objectives for a 10-year strategic plan
- Shifted communities from reactive to proactive justice approaches
- Emphasized long-term solutions to address ongoing trauma and victimization

PSA to Combat Substance Misuse

NCJTC and members of the FVTC media team worked with the Meskwaki Nation to create a three minute PSA supporting their substance misuse initiative.

What We Captured:

- Community-driven solutions in action
- Annual pow wow, rich culture and the voices of the Meskwaki Tribe
- Over 70 bison up close

Beyond Detention - Tribal Voices

We prioritize amplifying the voices of our Tribal partners and sharing their successes.

Over the past year we've worked hard on the concepts and development of Beyond Detention - Tribal Voices, a podcast highlighting Tribal perspectives and innovative programs transforming Tribal corrections and reentry. Now, as we head into 2026, it is set to launch.

Empowering Tribes to Strengthen Supervision and Reduce Recidivism

Our Tribal Probation and Re-entry (TPRA) Program provides Tribal corrections professionals with training and technical assistance to implement culturally relevant, evidence-based practices for American Indian/Alaska Native individuals.

Program Highlights:

- 20-week live-online Academy, expanded in 2024
- Supports new and returning professionals
- Strengthens re-entry services and improves justice outcomes in Tribal communities
- Builds capacity for culturally competent, individualized practices
